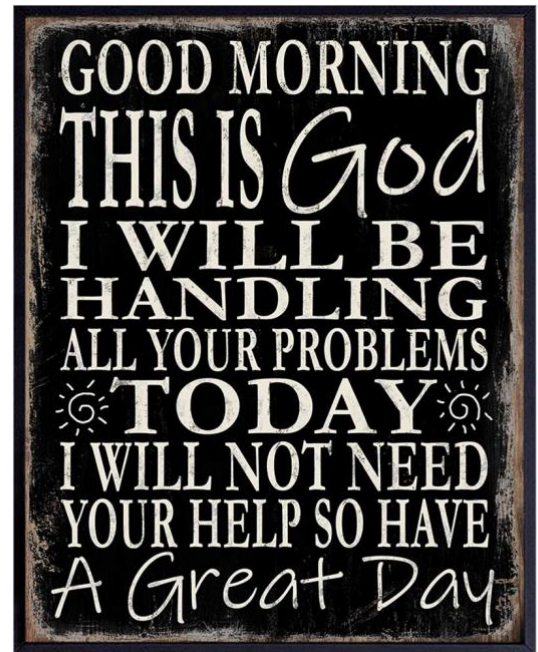

PATIENCE AND TRUST

This week's readings remind us to be patient and trust in the Lord. In the first reading, the prophet is calling on the Lord and nothing seems to happen. The psalm sings of hearing God's voice. In the second reading, Paul reminds us that the Spirit will give us self-control. In the gospel, Jesus tells us that God does not answer to us, but we must trust that He is working in our lives.

As disciples, we can't just pretend to follow Christ. True discipleship requires action. Jesus makes it very clear what we are supposed to do. We must love God and each other. We must care for the less fortunate in our midst.

Faith also requires a servant's heart. We can't just be people who do really good things. That can become an exercise in ego building. We feel that we are paving our path to heaven through our own actions. But we can't earn God's love. And we don't have to. We are here to serve. Let God do the rest.

Ask Yourself:

Do I tell God what I want and expect it immediately?

How can I learn to trust that God loves me?

Do I glorify God with my actions, or do I seek recognition for myself?

The Holy Rosary



Except for the Our Father, no Catholic prayer or devotion may be more revered than the Rosary. We Catholics instinctively turn to the Rosary in times of crises and life's sorrows, in the midst of personal and even public tragedies.

The Rosary includes six of Catholicism's most familiar prayers: the Apostles' Creed, the Our Father, the Hail Mary, the Glory Be, the Fátima Prayer ("O My Jesus") and the Hail Holy Queen. The inclusion of these prayers in the Rosary did not happen overnight but was a lengthy evolution down through the centuries.

There has long been a belief in the Catholic Church that St. Dominic de Guzman (1170-1221) is the source of the Rosary. His order, the Dominicans, tried to reverse vile teachings by roaming the countryside preaching against heresy, trying to influence the fallen away back into the Church. Tradition has it that St. Dominic's efforts were most effective following a visit from the Blessed Virgin Mary in the year 1214. Neither Dominic nor his order ever made this claim. However, numerous popes have advocated Dominic as indeed the source of the Rosary. While many see the Rosary as worshiping Mary, it is in fact focused on Christ. The mysteries of the Rosary are based on important events in the life of Christ. When we meditate on these mysteries while praying the Rosary, we consider these events and how they relate to our own lives and our relationship with Christ.

From the 16th century until the 21st century, there were three sets of mysteries: Joyful, Glorious, and Sorrowful. But in 2001, Pope St. John Paul II added the Mysteries of Light. The intent was to include meditations on the time in Jesus' life between His incarnation (a Joyful Mystery) and His passion (a Sorrowful Mystery).
