Caring for Others

This week's readings call us to care about others. In the first reading we are warned against being complacent while others suffer. The psalm praises the justice of God. In the second reading Paul reminds us to pursue virtues. In the gospel Jesus tells the parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus, where a wealthy man ignored the needs of a poor man every day.



The readings tell of a reversal of fortunes. They tell us that God will upset our notion of how the world should work. Those who have plenty will suffer. Those who suffer will know fullness of life. Jesus makes this point in a way which is particularly easy to understand. And this is a message he returns to over and over again in his teaching. Riches, esteem, and the things of this world must not distract us from serving God and his people. The rich man was so focused on his own comfort that he did nothing to help the starving Lazarus whom he saw every day. The law given in the Old Testament made it clear that caring for those in distress needs to be a priority. We also need to be detached from worldly goods in order to serve God. When our own comfort is our priority, then we are really just serving ourselves. Jesus calls us to join him in this mission of mercy because he wants us to know the true joy which comes from doing the Father's will.

Ask Yourself:

How am I helping my brothers and sisters in need?
What are some times when others gave me a helping hand?
Are there aspects of comfort which I am too attached to?

A Cardinal Who Became a Saint



John Henry Newman began his career as an Anglican churchman and scholar and ended it as a Roman Catholic cardinal. He was a seeker of truth his entire life, digging deeper and deeper to discover the truth about God and Christianity, eventually moving him to convert to the Catholic Church.

Even after he became Catholic, Newman continually searched for the truth and was never completely satisfied with his knowledge. He was canonized by Pope Francis in 2019. We celebrate his feast day on October 9th, the date of his conversion.
