## Dom Perignon

**Pierre Perignon** was a 17th century Benedictine monk living at the abbey of Hautvillers, an area which produced a wide variety of wines. An illness resulted in him becoming blind and he subsequently developed an extraordinary sense of smell and taste. He learned to mix together various kinds of grapes to produce fine blended wines from the abbey's vineyards. Toward the end of his life, he succeeded in producing grapes from France's Champagne region into what is today known as "champagne." After Pierre's death in 1715, a French wine company purchased the Hautvillers monastery vineyards and gave the name "**Dom Perignon**" to its finest champagne vintage. Every New Year's Eve, many people toast with Dom Perignon, not realizing they are celebrating the memory of a Benedictine monk. "Dom" (Lord in Latin) was a title sometimes given to monks.

## Spread the Good News

Today's readings inspire us to understand that Jesus has saved us, and we are called to spread that good news to others. In the first reading, we hear that Jesus ushers in a new era of freedom and salvation. In the second reading, Paul reminds us that we must be united in our efforts to evangelize. And in the Gospel, we hear Jesus calling Simon Peter and Andrew to join him in spreading the Good News.

Even in a time of darkness for Zebulun and Naphtali, God provided hope and light. Jesus also provides light by proclaiming the Kingdom of God.

In Jesus' time, rabbis would typically call on people who were knowledgeable and "good enough". But Jesus is calling fishermen and other people who would not have been considered worthy. God doesn't require us to measure up. We do not have to be wise or learned or skillful. We just need to be willing.

Diversity is good within the Christian community when it enriches the mission. Instead of suppressing different voices, we should seek to learn from each other and build strength from our differences.

### Ask yourself:

Where do I see light and darkness in our world today?  
How can I use my strengths to build up my parish community?  
How can I encourage and listen to diverse voices in the groups I belong to?



## Candlemas Day

The feast of the Presentation of the Lord, celebrated on February 2, commemorates the presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple at Jerusalem by his parents. Since it coincides with the fortieth day after childbirth, it also designates the Purification of Mary, as the feast was formerly called. In recent years, the focus of the feast has emphasized the presentation of the Lord, Jesus Christ, the true light of the world. Therefore, this feast has popularly been called Candlemas Day, and candles are blessed honoring Jesus as our savior who sheds light upon us and offers salvation to the whole world.

**To celebrate this feast, on Thursday, February 2, at the morning Mass, we invite you to bring your unlighted candles with you for the rite of blessing and sprinkling of water. We will provide candles should you need them. Blessed candles are burned by the faithful before shrines, and images of Christ or the saints, and in prayer, petition, thanksgiving, and praise.**

## The Baptism of Jesus

Since Jesus entered this world as the Son of God in a sinless state, why did he seek John the Baptist for baptism? John's baptism of the people was a ritualistic baptism of repentance and Jesus had nothing for which he needed to repent. However, by choosing to be baptized, Jesus fulfills all righteousness, preparing himself to be the perfect sacrifice for all humankind. At the Baptism of Jesus, all three Persons of the Blessed Trinity are involved - the Son being baptized, the Holy Spirit descending, and the Father booming from heaven, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Our own Baptism brought each and every one of us into this same circle of God's family and eternal life beyond death.
